
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Metaphysical drinks

In Tucson, Arizona, architect and musician Rob Paulus' cozy new cocktail bar really lifts the spirits

In designing Portal Cocktails in Tucson, Arizona, architect and jazz musician Rob Paulus went beyond the confines of perceived reality to ideate a place that taps directly into the soul.




considering their request, the architect realized that he wanted to design a nurturing 'vessel' in which cosmopolitan clientele could not only imbibe sophisticated mixed drinks, but also replenish their soul.

The journey started when clients asked him to conceptualize a high-end

bar and restaurant, Ermanos, which Paulus designed in 2015. After

curves made with strips of poplar wood. "Walk through the kaleidoscope-like, mirrored entry, and you are transported to a new consciousness," points out project manager Kenneth Lowe. "It is almost like returning to the womb in some ways," adds architect Paulus. As a result, Portal Cocktails becomes a "very welcoming place. The space pulls you where you feel more enlightened and willing to try different things," he continues. "It boots a cycle of positivity that patrons feel and share."
